Exploring Patterns in Your Family History Research

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Pattern Detectors:

- For the missing piece.
 - Collect family records.
 - Create a timeline.
 - Research collateral lines.
 - Add the extended family to the timeline.
 - Map the locales.
- For multiple generations.
 - Do not make assumptions.
 - Map locations.
 - Pay attention to state, county, and town boundaries.
 - Consider searching for records in the surrounding area.
 - Search for newspaper announcements, such as obits and wedding anniversaries in current and previous locales of residence.
 - Ask ... Why did they do that? Look for what might have influenced your ancestors' decisions.
 - Note other family member details in whatever format works best for you.
 - Create spreadsheets or lists that will help you visualize the family connections.
 - Explore the identical details among the family members
- For a neighborhood / community.
 - Collect records for the family.
 - Note the names of the other people and addresses that appear in the family records.
 - Track your ancestors' residences.
 - Pay attention to the Friends, Acquaintances, and Neighbors (FANs).
 - Use census and city directories to see who else might have been neighbors or possibly lived at the same address.
 - Create a way to track the information that works best for you.
 - Map the family.
 - Research the social history.
 - Ethnicity sourcebooks.
 - State guidebooks with ethnic chapters.
 - Historical books about the county or town.

- Area, region, and neighborhood.
- Histories of organizations.
