- Involuntary memory
- Involuntary explicit memory
- Involuntary conscious memory
- Involuntary aware memory
- Involuntary autobiographical memory
 - These bring to mind recollections of the past without conscious effort

- Case study
 - Adeline Koorsen
 - Born: 16 DEC 1874 in Fort Wayne, Indiana to John Michael Koorsen and Euphemia Viskorf
 - Moved to Ohio in fall of 1892
 - Married to August DePrez on 21 SEPT 1892 in Cleveland, Ohio
 - Birth of Son, Edward Charles DePrey on 9 NOV 1893 in Cleveland, Ohio
 - Birth of Daughter, Euphemia Katherine DePrey on 21 APR 1901 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
 - Death of Mother on 17 SEPT 1902 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
 - Death of Husband on 20 MAR 1903 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
 - Death of Son on 30 APR 1903 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
 - Married to William Carl Kolthoff on 24 NOV 1904 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
 - Death of Father on 24 NOV 1914 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
 - Death on 14 AUG 1953 in Fort Wayne, Indiana
