### Deciphering Handwriting in Genealogical Documents

*Deciphering difficult handwriting, regardless of the era of the document, is a skill that takes some practice, but it will improve over time. Start slow, be patient with yourself, and be willing to take a break from staring at a document for too long.*

#### **Basic Tips & Suggestions**

- Document Identification
  - What kind of document is it, and what time period is it from?
  - Become familiar with “standard language” used in certain documents (ex: deeds, wills, church records, etc.)
- Compare, contrast, & look for context clues
  - Read through the entire document and compare the sections, words, and letters that you can read with those that you cannot.
  - The content of the entire document can often help you determine what the words you are having trouble with say.
- Use Resource Guides – *\*[See the FamilySearch Research Wiki section below.](#)\**
  - Word Lists & Dictionaries
  - Language Guides
  - Gazetteers & Place Name Guides
- Make a copy of the original for notations
  - Drawing lines between letters
  - Writing the words legible words to help you compare the illegible words can help.
- Create a transcription
  - This can help you work through a difficult to read document and provide a copy that will be easier to quickly reference in the future.
- Digitally enhance the image
  - Enlarge it on your computer and adjust the brightness and contrast to create a (hopefully) more legible image.
- Don't be afraid to get another opinion!
