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What is the Beyond 2022 Project?

- **Primary Objective:**
 - To recover, reconstruct, and make freely accessible as many of the records that were lost in 1922 as possible.
- **Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland**
 - 150,000 records containing
 - 50 million words of searchable text
 - 6,000+ maps

Gold Seams

- Gold Seams are complete reconstructions of an entire record set that were destroyed in 1922. So far, there are three Gold Seams:
 - *1766 Religious Census*

Tips for Record Searching

- **Don't Search All Records**
 - Wildcard, truncation, quotations, etc. do not appear to work.
 - Due to the dual “inventory of loss” and “inventory of survival,” searching all records will provide too many items in the search results that don't really have records attached to them.
- **Browse the PROI Catalog– Not “Browse All”**

 - The Virtual Record Treasury mirrored its catalog on Herbert Wood's 1919 massive guide to the Public Records Office. The hierarchy Wood used in 1919 is *not* intuitive because it is not what modern researchers are familiar with, but there are still gems buried in this catalog.

- The two *most helpful* record collections for genealogists found in the PROI catalog:
 - *Ecclesiastical and Testamentary Returns*
 - I recommend clicking the dropdown arrow until you find “Parish Registers and Parochial Returns.” There is some gold in that record set:

 - **Miscellaneous Documents**
 - Due to the archaic record hierarchy used, there is a massive amount of record sets that don't get a “top level” listing, but you can find them filed under miscellaneous.
 - Go through the list of record sets (particularly the census returns) and their subcategories to see what is available.

 - Civil Registrations for birth (1864-1921), *marriage (1845-1946), **death (1871-1971)
 - *Catholic marriages do not begin until 1864
 - **They are working on adding deaths from 1864-1870, so stay tuned!
 - Parish Registers (both Catholic and Church of Ireland)
 - On-going project.

- Griffith's Valuation (1848-1868) - Ask about Ireland

 - Used to determine how much someone had to pay in taxes to the "Poor rate" and includes detailed information on where people lived in the mid-19th century.
- Tithe Applotment Books (1823-1837)
 - <http://titheapplotmentbooks.nationalarchives.ie/search/tab/index.jsp>
 - Used to determine the amount of money occupiers of agricultural holdings over 1 acre should pay in tithes to the Church of Ireland.
 - This is the next best thing to a pre-Famine Census in Ireland.
- Irish Ancestors (\$)

 - This is an awesome database that helps you get an idea of how many people with a certain surname lived in 19th century Ireland and where they lived. Additionally, this resource is great for helping you find what records have survived.

 - *Subscription based, but can be accessed for *free* in the Genealogy Center.
 - Hosts over 250 Irish record sets. The most significant collections are:
 - Griffith's Valuation 1847-1864

- Irish Prison Registers
 - Ireland Petty Session Court Registers
 - Irish Catholic Parish Registers of Baptisms
 - Irish Catholic Parish Registers of Marriages
 - Passenger Lists
 - Irish newspapers
- Roots Ireland (\$)

 - This is a great resource for Catholic and Protestant church records of baptisms, marriages, and deaths.
- Irish Newspaper Archives (\$)
 - <https://www.irishnewsarchive.com/>
 - This is the world's largest and oldest online database of Irish newspapers (1738-present).
- Representative Church Body Library (RCBL)

 - Home of the archives of the Church of Ireland.
 - There are a few parish register indexes available on their website, but this collection has not been digitized
