### **How to Maximize Your Search Using Fold3**

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#### **Basic Tips**

#### • Don't search the entire database

• I would start by narrowing down your search to see publications by either the conflict/war, geographic location, publication type (i.e. service records, applications, non-military, etc.), or branch.

# • Read the publication descriptions!

- When you find a publication that you want to search through (ex: Civil War Pensions Index), *read the entire description*. Oftentimes the titles of these publications are misleading, but the description will let you know exactly what is in that publication as well as how complete/incomplete a publication is.
  - For example, the Civil War Pensions Index (which is 99% complete) includes more than Civil War pensions because covers 1861 through 1900 and include Spanish American War and Philippine Insurrection veterans

# • Browse instead of search

• Fold3's algorithm can be even more finicky with name variations than other databases. I've found way more records by browsing within individual record publications than by searching because I can easily scroll through all of the similar name variants and potentially find records of my direct ancestor's siblings or cousins.

# • Look for your people in the records of others

Even if a record doesn't immediately jump out to you as relevant, take a minute and read through it to make sure your ancestor isn't mentioned somewhere. For example, records such as pension applications or southern claims often include affidavits written by the applicant's friends, neighbors, family, etc. and can provide a goldmine of information.

### Don't limit yourself to Fold3

 Record sets that you might find on Ancestry, Fold3, or FamilySearch are not created equal. You might find nuggets of additional info in each, so you lose nothing by searching multiple indexes.

# • Be patient with yourself!

- Despite being the go-to resource for military research, Fold3 isn't always the easiest database to use, so if you're struggling to find something—it is okay!
